Title: Patchwork Scarf with Flower Pin

It's super-easy to create this patchwork scarf that I designed. And it's also fun to customize your own look! Choose rich corduroy fabrics and colors like I did, or just use scraps from your fabric stash. Finish it off with a custom detailed flower pin, and if you like create a few more pins to cluster together when you wear your scarf.

Other: corduroy fabric, straight pins, needle, sewing machine, thread, button, pin backing, embroidery floss, fabric glue



### Scarf:

1. Start by gathering your supplies. I bought 4 different corduroys in  $\frac{1}{2}$  yard cuts for this project. I had enough fabric to make at least 2 scarfs. You'll also need your Fiskars rotary cutter and mat to cut your fabric patches for the scarf.



2. Trim three pieces of each color to 14 inches wide. Make the patches between 5 and 8 inches long/tall. (note: you may need to add or subtract patchwork pieces depending on how long you'd like your finished scarf to be)

3. Arrange patchwork pieces stretched along the floor or a table, (folded in half in the photo) as you'd like them to look in your finished scarf.

4. Unfold pieces and pin right sides together, stitching each with a  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch inseam, as you go.



5. Once all pieces are stitched to the next, press seams flat with an iron – all in same direction. Fold scarf in half with right sides facing inwards, or together.



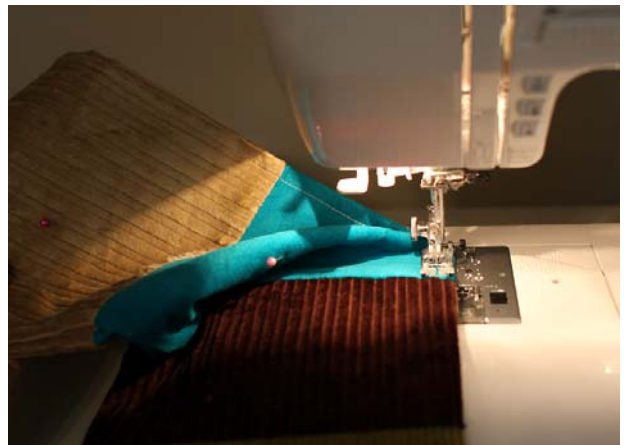
6. Pin edges at each seam mark, and then machine stitch first around open 7 inch end, then along length of scarf (using a  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch inseam) – but making sure to leave final 7 inch end of scarf open. Flip scarf right side out.





7. Press scarf flat and secure in place with a pin in approximately every patchwork color piece.

8. Tuck ends of open end inwards and secure with pins.



9. Topstitch around entire edge of scarf (using a  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch inseam) – this will secure the open end that you just tucked and pinned. Scarf is now complete!



#### Flower Pin:

1. To create the coordinating flower pin, gather leftover scraps from your scarf or other bits of coordinating fabric. Then use the Circle Shape Template to trim a large circle from brown corduroy using pinking shears. Then trim a medium circle from the green corduroy, and a small circle from the blue corduroy.



2. Machine stitch flower layers together as shown and then trim a green corduroy leaf using the Flowers template.

3. Stitch button to center of flower, use fabric glue to secure leaf to back of flower, and then pin backing to back of flower.

Your embellished scarf is now ready to get lots of use (and compliments!) this winter!
